forgiveness in much of western philosophy it examines common themes and divergences on forgiveness in the works of augustine kierkegaard and arendt these writers understood forgiveness as a paradox it must be contained to be given augustine granted yet not granted kierkegaard and forgotten the moment it is given as if never given at all arendt drawing on these insights can forgiveness be then thought of as a hidden existential capacity and not as a magnanimous display of mercy can we imagine forgiveness as undoing the transgression we see and secretly engaging with the imperceptible impossibility of undoing what has indeed been done

despite the increasing popularity of religion and science as an academic discourse the intersection of science and religion remains a front line in an ongoing culture war the reasons for this lie in an approach to discourse that closely resembles the model of discourse promoted by john rawls in which plural discourse such as between religion and science is based on a foundation of shared beliefs and established facts this leads to a doctrines and discoveries approach to the relationship of religion and science which focuses on their respective truth claims in an attempt to find areas of agreement this framework inherently privileges scientific perspectives which actually increases conflict between religion and science and undermines public discourse by inserting absolutes into it to the extent that the science and religion discourse adopts this approach it inadvertently increases the conflict between religion and science and limits our ability to address matters of public concern this book suggests an alternative model for discourse a disputational friendship based on the work of hannah arendt this approach recognizes the role that authorities and thus religion and science play in public life but undermines any attempt to privilege a particular authority because it promotes the position of the storyteller who never settles on a single story but always seeks to incorporate many particular stories into her account a disputational friendship promotes storytelling not by seeking agreement but by

exploring areas of disagreement in order to create the space for more conversations and to generate more stories and additional interpretations successful discourse between religion and science is not measured by its ability to determine truth or fact but by its ability to continually expand the discourse and promote public life and public judgment

hannah arendt 1906 1975 is likely to be the first woman to join the canon of the great philosophers arendt s work has attracted a huge volume of scholarship this collection reprints papers from the usa germany france and the uk where further scholarly work is emerging at an increasing pace given that there was vigorous debate of her work in her lifetime that there have since been several waves of evaluation and re evaluation and because a new generation of scholars is now coming to her work a systematic collection of the critical assessments of her thought is extremely timely

walzer termed the obligation to die finally turning to the political thought of hannah arendt the author suggests how the obligation could become justifiable although never entirely justified for the obligation to become at all justifiable the type of politics that the state enables must respect human diversity and individuality and restrict violence so that violence is not a continuation of politics

democratic anxieties same sex marriage death and citizenship proceeds from the surprising parallels between straight and gay opponents of same sex marriage with their apocalyptic rhetoric they inadvertently point to a frequently neglected existential dimension of democratic citizenship democratic anxieties argues that we must pay attention to the existential significance of democratic citizenship because otherwise we end up with anxious democracy a democracy that cannot fully embrace pluralism especially when the connections between sex death and citizenship are at stake this book pursues a less anxious conception of democratic citizenship in chapters on jean jacques rousseau hannah arendt and friedrich nietzsche feit reveals how rousseau diminishes democratic citizenship by linking it to existential consolation via sexual reproduction he interprets arendt as a queer theorist because she rejects the heteronormative pursuit of reproductive immortality yet the hope for immortality persists within arendt s conception of political action which delimits its democratic potential feit argues that nietzsche resists both rousseau s political idealization of heterosexuality and arendt s anxious alternative calling for an affirmation of death nietzsche creatively reimagines sexual as well as cultural reproduction that is pluralizes democratic citizenship the resulting more existentially aware democratic politics not only contributes to lesbian and gay equality but is also critical in a post september 11 world uses examples from fiction and film to show how theories about human nature can be applied by linking abstract theory to real life through story telling and story analysis this text offers a way of helping
